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Teaching from the heart

Every day, Community Action Head Start teachers and parents work together to support children on the path to success.

The following was written by a Community Action Head Start teacher:

In every teacher's journey, there will be a child who comes along that changes the way they think and teach—a child who pushes them to be better. For me, Mason is that child. Mason has autism, and when he joined our classroom he was mostly non-verbal. At the beginning, communication was very difficult, and we needed to use

a specialized app on the iPad to help him communicate his wants and needs throughout the day.

Bonding with Mason was easy, but learning to communicate with him was a little trickier. We would show Mason things and lead him to the table at meal or small group activity times and he would follow. Gradually, he began showing signs he was listening and knew exactly what we were talking about. Eventually, Mason began to sing familiar songs, say his ABCs, and learn his shapes, but he still had difficulty communicating his wants.

So, we continued to work as a team and with his special education providers to support him in building his communication skills.

I vividly remember the first day Mason responded to me. I had taken him to the bathroom and when he was finished I asked him, "Are you

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ready to go back to the room?" and this time he responded with, "YES, YES!" I think I almost cried that day.

I was so excited to tell his mom. Mason's mom is nothing short of amazing. She takes Mason to speech therapy and outpatient therapy twice a week. She continues to advocate for his needs. As part of his individualized education plan, a provider works with us four days a week. Mason's mom does an incredible job. We

remind her of that as

frequently as possible.

Mason has grown so much since joining our classroom. He is showing us something new every day. And while we have supported him in building his communication skills, he has also helped us create a real sense of classroom community where everyone belongs.

Our friends in our classroom love Mason. They ask to play with him, give him toys they know he likes, and have become so mindful of the way he communicates. He has changed our classroom community in the best way. I am so proud of his progress and can't wait to see that continue.

Thanks to their support, the Gathering Place has a new HVAC system, which will provide the increased utility efficiency we need to prepare and serve meals each night.

including systemic racial, gender, and other inequities. As one piece of this work, I'm pleased to share that Community Action has begun work to create and implement a formal agency Equity Audit and Action Strategy. All agency staff will be involved in this four-month process, as well as the Board of Directors and program participants.


I look forward to sharing more information with you as this work continues.

ane is strong, dedicated, and driven, with a heart for improving her community. And she's no stranger to hard work.

"I raised my kids all by myself, and my whole life I did manual labor," says Jane. "It was so rewarding, making the city I live in a better place."

Now in her 70s, Jane lives by herself and is navigating life with health concerns. "I'm so strong and I'm proud of myself," she says, "but I can't work anymore. I can't make my own repairs. It's just not physically possible. My home wasn't safe, but I didn't know what to do." Then, she heard about Community Action.

Through our Weatherization program, Jane received a new furnace and water heater last year, just before temperatures began to drastically dip. Her home is now not only safe, but warm.

"Before you came to do this for me, I just felt so alone," she says. "It's hard when you're old and you can't work, especially right now. I can't do the things I used to, or help out, and it had gotten me down. You all saved my life. You made things easier during this difficult time."

Jane has spent her whole life caring for others. We're honored to have had the chance to help her care for herself. *Thank you for supporting Community Action, and making connections like these possible.*

reg Brown, or "Grandpa Greg" as he is better known within the four walls of our Marvelous Manatees Head Start classroom, sits in front of an iPad from his Lincoln home. On the other end is a group of preschool-aged children settling onto their cots for naptime. Grandpa Greg just read them a naptime story – *The Very Hungry Caterpillar.*

"I think we have the best grandpa in the whole world," he overhears a child telling her teacher. "You know, we really should share him...but I don't want to!"

This is just one memorable moment Grandpa Greg, a volunteer within our Foster Grandparent Program, recalls from the past year – a year that has been marked by change he, like all of us, couldn't have anticipated.


You see, prior to COVID, Greg and his fellow Foster Grandparent volunteers served in-person. They were a part of the daily classroom setting – people our Head Start children and teachers looked forward to seeing every day, and vice versa. But since the

Foster Grandparent Program transitioned to a virtual model last year, Greg has embraced the opportunity to connect virtually, instead. Each day, he "Zooms" with his classroom during center lessons and story time, and even shares his love of art by sketching drawings to give to the children he works with.

"I try to base [them] on things they tell me they like," says Greg. "A little girl told me the other day that her favorite animal is a chicken. So this [drawing] is what's going to her next week."

Greg's involvement in the program means a lot to him, and for many different reasons. It allows him to continue pursuing his passion for education in retirement. It keeps him engaged in his community. And, perhaps most of all, he thinks it would have made his mom – who was instrumental in getting a Head Start program in Missouri started in the 1960s – proud.

We celebrate Greg and our seven additional Foster Grandparents for their dedicated service to our program. Thank you for giving them opportunity to exercise their passions to make a difference in children's lives.
