Then my kids got accepted into the Head Start program. I was so thankful. I could work. I still remember my first paycheck – it was about \$500. And that money I got I could save while my kids were receiving great care and love.

I could not have done that without Community Action. It was a lifesaver for me.

Everything in that classroom.

It is what pushed *me* to where I am right now. Today, I am a Community Action Family Engagement specialist.

On Mondays, Community Action's phone rings a lot. Utility bills are due. The furnace is making noises. Hot water is now cold. The paycheck is only so big. Difficult decisions are about to be made. Heat or food? Stay cool or medications? Water or heat? It's a circular recipe for poor physical and mental health outcomes for young and old.

It has a name: energy insecurity. And it's as scary as it sounds. To Beau, he knows it doesn't feel so great either.

"I was a single dad. No job. Broke. And lived in an inefficient house. The struggle was real. I used Community Action's weatherization services, and it took my



heating bill from \$280 to \$100."

Fast forward several years and Beau leads the Community Action-trained weatherization

The Weatherization team is skilled at installing doors, windows, insulation, energy-efficient appliances, air conditioners, furnaces and other cost-saving home maintenance. After such jobs, Beau now hears what such work means to each participant's life.

"We're so often told, 'You saved me money on utilities - now I can afford to pay for medication, food, so many other things,"" Beau said quietly. "And I'm like, 'I know."

Generosity and dignity make the Community Action Store shine bright



It's called the Community Action Store. And it's lit from within, by Larry.

"I really love the work we do here," said Larry, Community Action Store Coordinator. "Helping participants and making sure they get what they need when they need it. It just feeds the soul."

Your generosity keeps the Store stocked with top-of-the-list budget-stretching items such as diapers, shampoo, laundry detergent, and toilet paper. Then there are clothes of all sizes and various household items. Larry and dedicated volunteers make sure all items are washed and sanitized before hitting the store floor, where they can be taken home for free.

The Store is open for those who are active

Community Action program participants. As participants set and achieve individual goals, they receive points to redeem in the Store.

After two years on staff and 17 as a volunteer, Larry sees dignity within the effort made by each participant to meet their needs and their budgets using the Store. "Depending on what someone needs, you can get a lot with just 100 points."

And then there's the Holiday Toy Drive.

Last December you donated a record breaking 2,000-plus new, unwrapped toys to cover the Store tables and brighten the winter holiday season for your neighbors.
